(8th March - 25th March, 2017)

Aks International Minorities Festival: Film, Art and Dialogue was established in 2014 with its first edition in Pakistan. From the very start, the Aks festival has had a strong affiliation with Olomopolo Media in Lahore and since 2017, the festival has officially been in partnership with them. The festival's main agenda is to screen films related to minorities, engage in discussions and debates, and organize educational workshops, art exhibitions and performing arts events that promote awareness and dialogue about issues impacting minorities and marginalized groups.

The Aks Festival is proudly bringing its 4th edition to Pakistan from March 8-25, 2018, with a motive to engage the masses in dialogue for and about minorities and marginalized communities, create safe spaces for open dialogues and film screenings, bring communities together to improve capacity building, and strengthen inter-community solidarity and the building of bridges between the mainstream population and minority groups. The festival is growing bigger in 2018, through expanding its regions to new cities such as Peshawar and Hyderabad and also by outreaching to public spaces like universities, colleges, and other institutes. The Aks Festival also aims to encourage individuals/artists from Pakistan to showcase their work through film programs, workshops, art exhibitions and performing art events. We aim to create a forum for courageous individuals to share their stories and empower audiences with the knowledge that personal commitment can make a difference.

The Aks Festival 2018, along with its partner Olomopolo Media, is proud to announce that we have launched a new segment of the festival with a focus on films about and/or by women filmmakers; we will showcase a great variety of films with women as central subjects. Films in this segment will be shown from March 23-25 at Olomopolo Media.

Another important new event at the festival is Aks Outreach, through which we will be screening short films at different universities in Lahore, Islamabad and Karachi. Additionally, as a finale event, the festival will also introduce an element of recognizing artists and activists by appreciating them for their courage, hard work, and passion with two awards: the Aks Short Film Award and the Aks Human Rights Award.



Trans* Talents



Stand Up Comedy by Anaya Sheikh

Anaya Sheikh is trans* rights activist and theater actor who happens to be Pakistan's first transgender stand-up comedian. She started her career with performing with the Auratnaak troop, a group of feminist's individuals who address taboo topics through comedy and educate and advocate for the rights of minorities through their art of stand-up comedy. Anaya has also been involved with performance with other art based organizations like Propaganda and Olomopolo Media.

Anaya aims to shed light upon important issues and marginalization faced by transgender community through her performance. She has strong faith in the art of comedy, as it helps her express herself and claim rights for herself as transgender person and community member. Her favorite part of her stand-up comedy routine is when she roasts society for not accepting and acknowledging the co existence of transgender people in Pakistan.

Sebastian Beyer (Missy Lopes)

Sebastian Beyer has been working as a programmer for Hamburg International Queer Film Festival now for over a decade. He studied social work in Germany and Brazil and currently works in sex ed (sexual education) for different feminist organizations in Hamburg and Northern Germany. Furthermore, he is part of Kick-Ass-Queereeoké collective, who throw an infamous queer karaoke party not only to empower people through singing but also to raise funds for queer activists worldwide.



Billy Stewart

Originally from the UK, Billy Stewart is one of the co-directors of the PROUD Yangon LGBT Film Festival. The festival is the main cultural event for the LGBT community in Myanmar and celebrates the breadth and diversity of Asian Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex and Queer lives. Focusing on films from Southeast Asia and other Asian countries, as well as fostering new productions from young Myanmar activists and filmmakers, &PROUD's aim is to encourage discussion and debate around LGBT+ identities and to showcase the role of film in encouraging social debate. In January 2018, the Festival celebrated its fourth edition with around 10,000 people attending film screenings, performances, debates, and parties, including a new event in one of the public parks of Yangon. The fourth festival included over 23 films from 10 countries in Asia.

Nostalgic Past, Radical Future: Trans politics in contemporary Pakistan

8th March - 6pm - Saida Waheed Gender Initiative at LUMS

In the past decade or so, when legal and political developments regarding rights of communities marginalized on basis of gender identity/expression and sexual orientation have increasingly become part of popular public debate and state discourses in Pakistan, it bears asking: what does it mean to be Trans in Pakistan in the contemporary moment?

In order to unpack the evolution of trans politics in Pakistan in the last decade, our panel of researchers, community activists and academics will discuss the old and new trends in the community traditions, the formation of a modern transgender identity and state recognition/regulation of ambiguous bodies, the reconciliation of a historically organized hijra culture with an 'NGO-ized'movement for legal advocacy and civil rights and the conflicts within, and the influence of other stakeholders such as religious parties and tableeghi groups on the community.

Walter Benjamin often characterizes modernity as antiquity parading in disguise. In investigating the case of modern transgender rights movement in Pakistan, our panelists will try to formulate how a romanticized past, and nostalgia for it, have informed current debates about transgender rights in Pakistan and the limitations and conflicts of such a framework. Our activists, young and old, will shed light on future prospects of growth of this nascent movement and what is 'lost' in the process.

Mahleb Jameel is a grassroots community organizer and an independent researcher based in Lahore who works on issues pertaining to cultural politics of gender and sexuality in Pakistan. They are training to be an anthropologist and their work is located at the intersection of feminist, queer and post-colonial theory. Currently, they are working on various advocacy ventures in their capacity as an activist, including co-drafting and lobbying the Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Bill 2017 in the Parliament of Pakistan. However, their broader work these days draws on their own personal experiences as an ethnographer, looking at what it means to be trans/gender and non-conforming in a post-Afghan war 'security state' called Pakistan.



The Aks International Minorities Festival will be launching a new concept in 2018 for Pakistan: we will, along with our experts, present educational workshops in universities and colleges on the topics of gender diversity, minorities vs majorities, third gender politics and existence within/or by diverse communities. We will use performance art and short films to address these topics.

Gender and Society workshop

Iram Sana and Jannat Ali are two renowned activists and artists from Lahore with a background in human rights activism, theater and performing arts. They work extensively with the transgender community and other minority groups at various levels in their capacity building. They will introduce the workshop with a brief introduction to the Pakistani cultural and artistic landscape within the perspective of transgender community existence, importance and life issues. The attendees will be able to explore the comparative gender norms in their own societies. Their coexisting and unseen journey of being in a pluralistic society will be charted through an interactive session.

Aks Human rights Award

The Aks International Minorities Festival is introducing the Aks Human Rights Award this year. The award will be the pinnacle of human rights recognition for its winners. We are proud to acknowledge the outstanding contribution of individuals and/or organizations in promoting and protecting human rights and freedoms. The Aks Human Rights Award gives us a unique opportunity to share the stories and shine a light on the remarkable achievements of individuals and/or organizations. Its aim is to celebrate the hard-work, inspiration and dedication of those who champion the rights of ordinary people.

This year, we are absolutely proud to award Aashi Butt for her outstanding work for creating a shelter house, old age house, community center and safe space, Beghar Foundation, for the Khawaja Sira community in Lahore. She started working on this project in 2009, when she took this mission single-handedly, without any governmental funds or help from any NGO sector. She raised most of the funds through the traditional Khawaja Sira ritual of "Toli": she walked door to door of the wealthy in Lahore and gave blessings to newborns in the families, and in return they helped her with funds to complete her project, to make her dream come true. Beghar Foundation will soon open its doors for senior Khawjaa Sira persons, who are alone and deserve to be taken care of and live under safe circumstances with other members of the community. We are proud that Aashi Butt has literally put her blood and sweat in building this house, with no intention for any personal benefit.

CEAP - Child Empowerment Association of Pakistan is an NGO that has committed herself to combating the child sexual abuse epidemic in the country by empowering children and offering them self-protection strategies. Established in 2015, CEAP has since worked endlessly to ensure she grows into an organization that is able to serve its purpose to the fullest.

Knowledge of personal space and ability to voice to uneasy help children not only respect their own boundaries but also those of others. However, transmitting this information requires understanding, preparation and persistence. For this purpose, CEAP has incorporated an adult and youth training program that facilitates learning of the present and future caregivers.

Additionally, our child empowerment curriculum is especially designed to cater to different age groups and levels of understanding. These are comprehensive, child friendly lessons that enhance knowledge in an interactive, enjoyable way.

CEAP has also worked on a documentary to address the issue of child protection rights in Pakistan, Aks festival will show part of their work before the talk.

Intro documentary:

'In Plain Sight - A Documentary on CSA in Pakistan' is our latest venture at CEAP towards eliminating all forms of child sexual abuse in Pakistan. The documentary follows the story of a sexual abuse survivor and how it impacted him at a very young age. Synchronously, it outlines the legal, societal and cultural factors that contribute to the silencing of victims. Through documentaries, social media campaigns and awareness sessions, CEAP seeks to not only highlight the magnitude of the problem but also to actively work towards a safer future for our children.

Aks International Minorities Festival and CEAP will host talk on children rights in Pakistan.

A Suitable Girl 21st March - 5pm - Hyderabad

A Suitable Girl follows three young women in India struggling to maintain their identities and follow their dreams amid intense pressure to get married. Ritu, Dipti and Amrita represent the new India. Educated, financially stable and raised with a mix of traditional and contemporary values in the urban cities of Mumbai and New Delhi, they have access to the world in ways their mothers did not. Yet their lives take a dramatic turn when the pressure of settling down and getting married hits. Career aspirations become secondary to the pursuit of a husband, and the women struggle with the prospect of leaving their homes and families to become part of another.

Outrun documents the historical political movement of Bemz Benedito, who dreams of being the first transgender woman in the Philippine Congress, and her eclectic team of queer political warriors. While taking their equality campaign to another level, the activists mobilize working-class trans* hairdressers and beauty queens to join the fight against their main political opponent: a homophobic evangelical preacher. This film provides a unique look into the challenges LGBT people face as they transition into the mainstream and fight for dignity, legitimacy, and acceptance across the globe.

Devki finds herself in a continuous conflict between her wish to be emancipated and the deeply-rooted traditions of Indian society. Where to, Miss? follows this courageous young Indian woman over a period of three years as she goes through three stages and roles: daughter, wife and mother. Her greatest wish in life is to become a taxi driver. She would like to ensure that other women reach home safely and be financially independent. To achieve this, Devki must find a way to fulfill her dreams without alienating her family.

Mulhapar interweaves their family destinies, individual stories and anecdotes into a living mosaic. With its richly diverse images and philosophically pensive narrative, Mulhapar is a poetic film committed to showing the essence and diversity of human existence in a respectful, natural and undogmatic manner.

Zaynab (Fawzia Mirza) like a good Muslim daughter lives with her recently widowed mother Parveen (Shabana Azmi) who is obsessed with soap operas and finding husband for immigration lawyer daughter. However, sharing a home together comes at a cost; the constant re-arrangements in the flat and motherly interference in Zaynab's life. There are few things Parveen doesn't know about her daughter, her preference for women being one of them. But shen Mexican firebrand Alma comes into Zaybab's life and she falls in love, this puts a whole different pressure on living with mum. A "mum com" as Fawzia describes it, the film is a funny and poignant story about relationship between mother and daughter, but also an important portrayal, especially in our modern political landscape: with Muslim, Pakistani, and queer voices all being suppressed individually, the idea of the three identities intersecting is foreign to mainstream media.




Apricot Groves 16th March - 8pm - T2F, Karachi

Apricot Groves tells the story of Aram, an Iranian Armenian who has been living in America since childhood and has fallen in love there with an Armenian girl. With the help of his older brother, he returns to Armenia to ask her father for permission to marry her. What appears to be a simple story, however, becomes a moving meditation on the themes of secrecy and identity. In this confrontation between the constraints of tradition and the freedom of love, love has already won, but not without tragedy and sacrifice to appease its demands. Iranian director Pouria Heidary Oureh constantly challenges his audience to explore the film that addresses so many complex issues in its modest running time, but never loses sight of the simple humanity of its characters.



Dir: Shaz Bennett | Country: USA | Duration: 83 min | Year: 2017 | Language: English Tough but diva fabulous, Leo, an aspiring drag superstar, is stuck working in a fish cannery in Alaska. He and his twin sister are trapped in the monotony of fist fights and fish guts. Out of necessity, Leo learns to fight back, which catches the attention of the local boxing coach. When a new boy moves to town and wants to be his sparring partner, Leo has to face the real reason he's stuck in Alaska. Cinematic Alaskan scenery provides the perfect setting as the sparring partners conjure up romantic sparks both tense and tender together.

Afghanistan's first female film director Shahrbanoo Sadat brings a mixture of ethnography and subtle social criticism, with a generous dose of magical realism.

In a small Hazara village in the heart of Afghanistan, the shepherd boys obey the rules: to watch over the flocks and keep away from the girls. As they practice on their slingshots to keep the wolves away, the girls smoke secretly, play at getting married. "Wolf and Sheep" focus on the children through whom Sadat shows the trial and tribulations of growing up and of dealing with decisions of adults, like whom they will most probably become in the near future. Written into the film script, and common to many regions, is a local fairy-tale which adds a mysterious and curious contrast to rural realism.

Pakistan's Hidden Gems

The works of Bilal Minto, Khalid Gill and Kanwal Khoosat are being chosen to showcase in our section Pakistan's Hidden Gems at Aks 2018. Khoosat's film Ao Kahani Buntey Hain (2011) was banned for broadcast on PTV, whereas Minto's World Ka Centre (2001) and Gill's Chan Di Chummi (2009) have been screened in film festivals and broadcasted on television within and outside of Pakistan.

Minto's World Ka Centre is effortlessly political for critiquing the debate around World Trade Centre by showing an ordinary day in Lahore on 9/11, 2001. Minto's earlier tele-film, Javed Shampoo, showed a colonized, classist upper class and their drawing-room debates on Western Imperialism and American exceptionalism.

World Ka Centre is subtler in continuing that conversation, this time by focusing on its characters and their lives more as the 'center of the world' goes down.

Khalid Gill's Chan Di Chummi profiles Khawaja Sira women around Lahore who deal with ordinary themes of love, separation, aging, survival, social acceptance and longing. It is Mr. Gill's first and last film.


Kanwal's Khoosat's Ao Kahani Buntey Hai stars Nauman Ijaz as Girya (trans* lover) and Sania Saeed as a Khawaja Sira working in a circus show. These may be the most daring and atypical roles done by mainstream actors and the subject to be produced on Pakistani TV to date.

Shot beautifully in Lahore, Chan di Chummi is a probing study but compassionate portrayal of the subculture of Lahori Khawaia Sira (transgender women) community. In the opening scene, veteran script writer and director Khalid Gill says that as a child he was mystified by the Khawaja Sira people wandering around in the streets of Lahore, and he has tried to demystify them in the film. The documentary features three magnificent persons, Ainee, Sonya and Boots. Gill intimately explores in-depth the lives of these people shunned by the mainstream society. He examines the myths, folklore and superstitions surrounding them, including the misconception that they can bring good or bad luck upon others. Khalid Gill indeed left us with a true gem: Chan di Chummi will always remain a masterpiece to understand the cultural richness of Lahore and its mystical subcultures.



English subtitles

World Ka Centre is set around September 11, 2001 in urban Lahore as the so-called 'Centre of the World' goes down in New York City. The film deals with themes of class, male sexuality, the American dream and contrasts de colonial and colonial thought through its two main characters. The filmmakers are aware of and beautifully capture the air, sound, and pulse of Lahore's lower and middle class neighborhoods of early 2000s, when hook-up apps were non-existent, FM radio was college girls' best friend, hash, bootlegged booze and porn films were college boys' choices to chill, bored housewives visited VCD shops for Bollywood blockbusters, and the American dream was about to become distant.
